Dear Mr. McQueary:

I am pleased to confirm the University's commitment regarding the following terms for your continued employment as Assistant Football Coach.

- 1. You will continue to perform such duties as may be assigned to you by the Head Football Coach, Joseph V. Paterno.
- 2. If you are employed as Assistant Football Coach at the time of Joseph V. Paterno's departure as Head Coach, and in the event you are terminated by the University, other than for cause, and as a consequence of the decision of the new head coach to not continue your employment as Assistant Football Coach, you will be entitled to the following severance benefits:
 - a. The University will continue paying your salary for a period of eighteen (18) months, or until you secure another football coaching position elsewhere at a salary equal to, or greater than, your University salary at the time of termination; provided however, in the event your new salary in another football coaching position is less than your University salary at the time of termination, you will be paid the difference between your former University salary and your salary in the new coaching position for a period not to exceed eighteen (18) months from the date of termination of your University employment.
 - You will be entitled to continue using the dealer car and cell phones assigned to you for a period of three (3) months following the date of termination of your University employment.
 - c. You shall have such rights to health insurance for you and your family at the time of termination as are provided by COBRA coverage and University policy. In the event you elect COBRA coverage, University

shall pay all COBRA premiums for a period not to exceed eighteen (18) months from the date of termination of your University employment.

3. All of the terms of this commitment are completely confidential except for (a) disclosure required by law or in connection with legal proceedings between the parties, or (b) disclosure by you to members of your immediate family or to your attorneys, accountants or tax advisors.

I am delighted to be able to make this commitment in recognition of your outstanding service as Assistant Football Coach.



Tom Bradley Press Conference November 10, 2011

Q: How do you feel about the recent events leading up to your current position as interim head coach of the Nittany Lion football team?

A: I take this job with very mixed emotions due to the situation at hand. I've been asked by the University, Board of Trustees and Rodney Erickson to handle this, last night. I will proceed in the matter that Penn State expects. I met with the players last night and today and told them that the expectations will remain. We're not going to waver from that. That's where we are right now. The players came over to the Lasch Building last night and we talked about certain things. We proceeded this morning to have a staff meeting followed by an 8 a.m. team meeting.

Q: Do you have any immediate reservations?

A: I have no reservations about taking this job.

Q: When and how did you learn that you would become the interim head coach?

A: I was actually down in my office watching film like I do every Wednesday night. Around 9:40 p.m., the phone rang and it was Rodney Erickson. He asked if I would accept the job as the team's interim head coach and I accepted. I proceeded to get in contact with team captains and other individuals so we could immediately get started on the process.

Q: Your brother (Jim) said that you were saddened about the entire situation and that you face a huge challenge. How are you handling this situation?

A: I did talk to my brother last night. I grieve for the victims and the families. I'm deeply saddened by the events and I express that with great emotion. We'll get working on the football aspect right away but everyone should know where our team is with this entire issue. We're with the children and their families. Our thoughts and our prayers are with them.

Q: Have you spoken with Joe Paterno yet? How did he handle the news of him being fired from his position as the head coach?

A: I spoke with Coach Paterno around 11 p.m. last night. I think that conversation is personal in nature.

Q: Will Mike McQueary be coaching in the upcoming home game against Nebraska? Will McQueary be coaching on the sideline or in the press box?


A: Yes, Mike McQueary will be coaching on Saturday. It'll be a game time decision as to where he will be placed.

Q: Given how long you've been here, did you think it was appropriate for Joe Paterno to receive his termination via phone call?

A: I wasn't actually aware of the method of Paterno's termination until this morning. As far as the method, it's not for me to say. The Board of Trustees made a decision. That's their decision.

Q: Can you explain what you came to know about that 2002 incident described in the grand jury report concerning former assistant coach Jerry Sandusky?

A: Due to the ongoing investigation, I won't say anything about the matter.



Q: How involved will you be with the offense? What will be the process that you use to determine the starting quarterbacks and how you will use them on the field?

A: I talked to the team today and I think they know me pretty well. I am who I am and I'm not going to change. When the time comes, I will sit down with the coaching staff and we will determine who the starting quarterback will be. Right now, we've made some decisions on staffing positions but we're not completely sure. Right now, Larry Johnson and Ron Vanderlinden will be co-coordinators on defense. I'm not sure if we'll be able to get it into full swing for Saturday's game since we haven't practiced signals and calls for those positions. Our defensive graduate assistant, Elijah Robinson, will become a full-time coach today.

Q: Some people have stated that all of the current football staff should be replaced. How would you feel if these changes were to be made in the future?

A: That's a decision that is up to the Board of Trustees and Penn State University. It's not my decision. I've been asked to do a job and I'm going to do it.

Q: Can you characterize your relationship with Jerry Sandusky and how shocked were you when you heard the allegations?

A: I won't comment on the allegations. Sandusky was a defensive coordinator when he worked with the Nittany Lions and I worked underneath him.

Q: Is it reasonable for the public to assume that Mike McQueary and Joe Paterno were the only coaches aware of Jerry Sandusky's alleged perversions?

A: Due to the ongoing investigation, I'm not going to discuss that matter.

Q: From a reputation standpoint, what must Penn State and the Nittany Lion football team do to rebuild the community's trust off the football field?

A: I think we've got to understand that this team has put in a lot of hard work. Saturday will be Senior Day for many of them. They deserve to have this day. That's what they've worked for this entire year. My job is to make sure that it happens. As far as reputation, I believe that Penn State will go about it in the proper manner and restore the proper principles of The Pennsylvania State University.

Q: First of all your thoughts about the riots last night in the wake of the decision about Joe Paterno and do you worry about the safety and atmosphere for the players and fans in the stadium on Saturday?

A: I do understand there was some activity last night and no I do not worry about the safety of our players on Saturday.

Q: You met with the players last night. How are they dealing with such a monumental change right now?

A: Well, obviously, a lot of them are in shock. They have mixed emotions. When I called up and spoke to the captains, a whole bunch of guys came over to the Lasch Building last night and piled into my office and we discussed team matters.

Q: Will the team be playing after Saturday? A: Hopefully so. That is up to the administration.

- Q: Coach, you guys have a lot left to play for. Can you talk about getting this team back together considering what they have been through and trying to march forward with what could potentially still be in front of them?
- A: We have great leadership on this football team. Once again, when I spoke to them this moming, it is their team. They are not here for me. I am trying to help them be as good as they can possibly be and that is the direction we are going. If there is any problem, they will be focused. My job is to make sure they stay focused. Obviously, they have liad a tremendous amount of distractions over the past week. It is a very resilient group. They will come to play on Saturday.
- Q: Tom, given the intense national scrutiny for Mike McQueary, why do you think it is appropriate for him to coach in this game and be the face for this University?

 A: That is a decision that is up to the administration and Mark Sherburne, our acting athletic director.
- Q: Was there any consideration given to dismissing Mike McQueary? Were you a part of any conversation whatsoever about potentially relieving him of his duties with the football team? A: Absolutely not.
- Q: I know you have waited a long time to be a head coach. I couldn't imagine you thought it would be under these circumstances. Can you sum up your feelings?
- A: Well, we are obviously in a very unprecedented situation. I just have to find a way to restore the confidence and to start a healing process with everybody. I am going to try and go about it. As I said earlier, it is with very mixed emotions and a heavy heart that this has occurred; that we are going through this.
- Q: You said that you hope that this team can finish the rest of the season, but it is up to the administration. Are you saying there is a chance the administration could cancel the rest of the season?
- A: That has never come up yet, so that is why I am not sure of that question.
- Q: I understand you're reluctant to maybe go in this direction, but in the interest of transparency and getting everything off to as fresh and clean a start as possible. Could you comment on what you did know about the Sandusky allegations and what steps you may have taken and why or why not you did report them, if you knew?
- A: I have answered this question before. Due to the ongoing investigation, I am not going to comment on that matter.
- Q: What do you think the (mindset) of your team will be with all this craziness? How do you think they will play Saturday?
- A: I think they will be ready to play Saturday. They had a lengthy team meeting after I got done today. They talked it out. This afternoon there is a letter arriving from the former Penn State football lettermen who wrote a letter to these guys explaining to them the importance of what Penn State means and I think they will be ready to play.
- Q: In light of what happened with student conduct last night. What message would you have for students anticipating before, during and after the game Saturday?
- A: Well, I think the message is clear. Let's show them what Penn State is really all about. It is not about some of those activities. Let's show class, let's show dignity and let's show what we are really all about.

Q: How has all of this impacted recruiting? I have to imagine it is difficult to explain this to kids who are looking at the program.

A: I will address tonight at 7:30 p.m. with the parents and families of our current players and after that, at 8 p.m., I will address the recruits.

Q: I understand that you are unwilling to speak about the specific allegations. In general what are your thoughts about whether football coaches have a responsibility to report wider allegations of sex crimes, either to officials or police. Do football coaches have a wider responsibility beyond what goes on the field with the players?

A: We all have a responsibility to take care of our children. All of us.

Q: When these allegations first surfaced, were you aware Coach Sandusky was still on campus, still had an office, was still working out. If so, what did you about that? What was your feeling about that?

A: Yes, I was aware of that. This was taken to a higher authority that was handling that.

Q: Do you think it was appropriate for him to remain on campus?

A: Once again, this is on-going investigation, I'm not going to answer that question.

Q: This has obviously tarnished Joc Paterno's legacy. How do you repair Penn State's image that this point?

A: That is a rather lengthy answer and I could get into that, but I'm not sure I have all the answers right now.

Q: There has been a movement on the social networks, on the media networks to try and get a lot of the former players to come back. Have you been in contact with any former players or have they been in contact with you in support?

A: I've been here for 35 years, you would think I would have a lot of emails right now with the former players. I do not know if you know about the Penn State players, but it is a tight knit group. It is a family group and they will be here on Saturday.

- Q: After Paterno's resignation, this would have been his last home game. Are there any plans to have any tribute or acknowledgement to him and if so, do you think that is appropriate? A: Right now, I am not sure if there are any. I do not know where that stands. Obviously, if the players do a tribute, there is not anything I can do about that. I am not aware of any University plans right now.
- Q: I know it is very soon. Can you talk about Saturday and the contrast between showing empathy and at the same time showing solidarity when you talk about players coming back and the like?

A: I think the solidarity is with everybody. First off, the thoughts and prayers of everybody are with the families and the children. So, it is more than football and they realize that. They are coming back on Saturday and a lot of them (are) because they want to show support for the Penn State program, the pride that they have in Penn State Football and the Penn State University.

Q: In your mind, where do you think Joe Paterno should be on Saturday?

A: Coach Paterno has meant more to me than anyone except my father. I do not want to get emotional and start talking about that.

Q: When did you get the sense that this thing was going south or this might happen?

A: I never had a sense that this was going to happen. I was down at the office working on the game plan (Wednesday night), actually, and I did not have any idea what was going on.

Q: What is Jay Paterno's status on your staff and have you discussed this with him? What are his feelings on all of this?

A: I texted Jay earlier this morning. We met right after the staff meeting. He will be coaching on Saturday. Jay is a great competitor. He knows he has a job to do. He wants to do that job. I'm sure he has a heavy heart and love for his father, but he will be with the team.

Q: Do you think [Joe Paterno] should have had one last home game? Should he have been allowed to coach this one last game?

A: The whole week has been something of a whirlwind. It's been an unprecedented week. I'm sure the Board of Trustees made a decision with the facts that they had and they decided to do what they did. I often tell my players -- players play, coaches coach, administrators administrate. I was not involved in those discussions and with the facts that they had, they thought that this was best for the University.

Q: You've been in charge on the sideline before, while Joe was hurt and in the coach's booth. How much of that has prepared you for this and not having total chaos on Saturday?

A: We've had that happen before. In 2006, Coach wasn't here. He was up in the box and we've functioned with him in the box before and it will be business as usual on that sideline on Saturday.

Q: You mentioned it would be a game-time decision on Mike's role whether he would be upstairs, and if he is will you move somebody downstairs? Has that process been mapped ont?

A: Yes, that process has been mapped out. If he's upstairs, we will have (graduate assistant coach)

Terrell Golden; he will do the duties that Mike was doing on the sideline.

Q: Was there any indication between you and Joe that you would speak again before the game? A: Once again, that conversation is personal in nature.

Q: How have the players handled this very chaotic week and what do you expect from them on Saturday?

A: As I stated before, the expectations are the expectations. They know what they have to get done, I expect them to come out and play a good hard football game. They've prepared themselves, they've worked awfully hard and I would be disappointed if they didn't.

Q: Can you put into words why McQueary gets to coach on Saturday but Joe Paterno does not? A: Once again, that's based on the administration.

Q: What do you think Coach Paterno's legacy is going to be?

A: Coach Paterno will go down in history as one of the greatest men. Maybe most of you know him as a great football coach. I've had the privilege and the honor to spend time with him, he's had such a dynamic impact on so many, so many and I'll say it again, so many people and players' lives. It's with great respect that I speak of him and I'm proud to say that I worked for him.

Q: Have you slept at all?

A: Do I look that bad? No, no, I have not. It started last night and there were a lot of things that needed to get done before this morning. I have not slept yet.

Q: When you replaced Jerry Sandusky in 2000, what was your understanding of why he was leaving at the age of 55 or so?

A: Coach Sandusky got the retirement package that was released for a lot of state employees. Coach Sandusky was a professor here at the university, he had the opportunity to retire and get, I believe, 35 years. The last year he worked for us, he was a consultant. He had actually retired in that summer.

Q: You had not heard any allegations at that time? A: No.

Q: Have you had a chance to prepare the way you wanted to for this game? Has this caused a problem with doing the preparations needed?

A: It has not caused a problem; obviously today will be a little bit different when we go to practice. One of the great things about our staff is that we've been around for a long time and we know how to adjust. We each know each other's strengths and weaknesses. We know what has to get done.

Q: What would you say to those who question how involved Joe was on a day-to-day basis in the past five years or so?

A: Well, Coach, as the time went on, was a lot more involved than everyone thought. He knew everything that was going on. On defense, he would critique it. We knew what was expected of us to get done and if Coach didn't like it he was going tell us, for sure. He would set the parameters and we would work within them.

Q: Can you compare your emotions back in 1999 when you were named Defensive Coordinator to right now? I'm sure they are very different.

A: Obviously, very different mixed emotions. Back in 1999, it was an opportunity when Coach Sandusky was retiring and Coach Paterno asked if I would like to be the Defensive Coordinator. It was a very different emotion back then. I was excited. It was a challenge. This one comes with very, very mixed emotions

Q: You've been a lifelong Penn State guy. What are your thoughts and emotions seeing this university's reputation being dragged through the mud across the country, around the world, over the past few days?

A: Well, it's been very difficult. Very difficult to go through this but I'm confident that we will find a way to heal, to get back on track and to come together.

Q: You said you were not aware of Sandusky allegations in 1999, were you aware of them in 2002?

A: No.

Q: When do you plan to sleep and are you planning on trying to see Coach Paterno in person before the game Saturday?

A: I'll sleep when it's time to sleep. I will talk to Coach Paterno again in the near future, I'm not sure when I will. I think you know about Coach, I know he'll say, "Would you just stay focused on the task

at hand. You know what has to be done." I know him well enough to say, "Take care of the kids. Take care of the team. I'm okay." It's just the way he's going to be. I don't think he would want me to come over to the house; he might kick me out anyway. He would tell me to, "Go do what you need to do."

Q: How do you get the players to really focus on just football admits all of this?

A: One thing I have tried to do and I have made a point of doing is letting the captains do most of the talking. They are the guys the team selected to lead them. I let them do most of the talking. Together we will get this team ready to play.







comments: Add my name to those who have threatened Mike McQueary. Surely he will never step foot on a football field again. If he does he needs to be shot. He's surely in my sights and I only hope someone shoots him before I get a chance.

By the way, the conduct of your department is disgusting as well. What a bunch of cowards who would put the reputation of the university above the safety of a young boy.

I searched Whitepages.com and found the number came back to a cell phone. I also searched on line databases for the name of John Stewart in the Melbourne, Florida area. The name was too common to narrow down the suspect. I then found the contact number for the Melbourne, Florida police department. I called their dispatch center and spoke with a communications officer. She advised checked the name through their records but without a date of birth, she was unable to provide information to how common the name was.

I then called the number left in the email. I received a voice mail which did not identify the owner. I left a voice mail identifying myself and asking John Stewart to call me back so I could speak with him about an incident.

Approximately 10 minutes later, the phone I made the call from in the report room rang and Officer Aschenbrenner answered. I saw on the caller ID the call was from a number in the 321 area code. It was identified as being from Paragon Printing. When I checked on line resources, a John Stewart was listed as being associated with Paragon Printing. I had Officer Aschenbrenner hand the phone to me and I spoke with the individual.

I identified myself and asked him if he had posted anything or left a message with our agency. The caller identified himself as John Stewart. He said he did leave a message. Stewart quickly became agitated. I advised him the statement he made could be a violation of the law in Pennsylvania. Stewart replied, "I don't give a fuck"! I advised he he could face the possibility of extradition to Pennsylvania. Stewart advised he was in Florida and we had better things to do. I advised him the threats he made could be criminal and despite what he thought, he could be arrested. Stewart replied he didn't care and he would love it if we came and arrested him. Stewart continued on by saying he worked in business and public relations for years and said he would love it if we arrested him. I asked him for his date of birth and promptly hung up the phone.

Once the phone call was completed, I had confirmation the John Stewart listed as being associated with Paragon Printing was the one who made the threat, I called Melbourne P.D. to obtain more information. I was informed by their communications center the business was in the jurisdiction of Brevard County Sherrif's Office (BCSO). I called that agency and advised them who I was and why I was calling.

The communications officer I spoke immediately recognized the name when I provided her with the address. She advised they had a caution listed with Stewart's name. Stewart had been listed as an individual who sent threatening notices to a law enforcement agency in Michigan. He also had cautions as he had previously made references to shooting law enforcement officers who came to get him. Stewart also claimed to have proficiency with firearms. I advised the communications officer I would like a deputy to speak with Stewart if possible and could provide them with our case files if they wished to open an investigation. The BCSO communications officer advised a deputy would call our

agency prior to responding.

I made contact with Sqt. Black from BCSO. I advised him of the situation. He advised he was outside of Paragon Printing and would speak with Stewart. He told me he would call back with additional information once he completed his interview.

I spoke with Sgt. Black again at approximately 1730. He advised he spoke with Stewart via telephone as Stewart had left his office for the day. Sgt. Black advised Stewart was agitated and "bull headed". Stewart had reiterated to him he thought we had better things to do than speak with him. Sgt. Black also told me he thought Stewart was now more mad at me than McQueary as I had told he could be extradited to PA. He also told him his actions were inappropriate in this day and age and also told him he was to have no contact with McQueary in the future. I thanked Sgt. Black for his time and assistance.



Tom Bradley Transcript

Q. Tom, after such an emotional week and game, are you concerned that the players will have something left in the tank this week?

COACH BRADLEY: I hope so. We had a good practice yesterday. It was short. And today is our Tuesday practice and It will be a padded practice. It will be very energetic and enthusiastic. And I'll back off Wednesday and Thursday because of the concerns I have with their legs; it's been a long season.

I'll take the pads off of them Wednesday and Thursday and just get them fresh for Saturday...

Q. Tom, what was your reaction yesterday to the Big Ten removing Coach Paterno's name from the league's championship trophy?

COACH BRADLEY: I just think it's another part of a tragedy that's occurring. .

Q. Has the coaching staff caught up with all the changes that you have made last week? COACH BRADLEY: I should go over those changes right now. For this week's game, last week I still was involved with the defense, calling the defensive most of the calls during the game.

But this week Coach (Larry) Johnson and Coach (Ron) Vanderlinden will make the calls on defense. And I've elevated Elijah Robinson. I told you before, Elijah will become one of our full time coaches. And Bill Kavanaugh will move up, and Bill will be our wide receiver coach from here on out.

Q. Now that the players have last week's emotions and how tough that was, all that behind them, do you get any kind of sense, can you maybe explain how you think they'll react now this week to everything? Do you get a sense of that at all already?

COACH BRADLEY: Well, they were great yesterday at practice. We talked briefly before practice about the game and where we were headed.

I think a lot of times, with everything that swirls around them, they enjoy coming to practice because it's the one time they can just kind of be with themselves.

No one's asking them questions; they're there to play football. And they know they have a job to do this week. We're still in the hunt for this Big Ten Championship. And they know where we're headed, going out to The Horseshoe; they know it's going to be a tough football game.

Q. Are you concerned for your players and coaches as representatives of Penn State going into another city following all the troubling news of last week?

COACH BRADLEY: No, not at all, We've been contacted by Ohio State. Luke Fickell called me the other day. We've been assured there will be no problems.

Q. Are you concerned at all you talked a little bit about confusion and sort of communication issues early in the game last week with the offense. Are you concerned that in giving up calling the defensive signals, you create that possibility on the defensive side?

COACH BRADLEY: Well, that's a good question. With a week to work on it, we should be okay. I'm always there if we have to go back to doing some things the old way. But I just don't have my hands on it this week at all, very little. I've watched film and tape. I'll have the game plan in my hand. I'll know obviously what we're calling. And I can interject if I want to and I can get back in that at any time.

The confusion on offense was one that, when we lost Mike (McQueary) for the game and the way we operate with Coach Paterno upstairs and Mike downstairs, we have a system. And when you change your system we didn't have a chance to prep)the system a whole lot the way we were going to send in plays, personnel groupings with our wide receivers, was really where there was not confusion, but we weren't as precise as we had to be...

We've addressed those issues. We've had a chance now to talk about how we're going to do things a little bit differently. A tot of it was just some terminology that was going on. And the first time you do anything, usually before the season we work on this up here and we practice it, but we didn't have a chance to do that...we'll be better at that this week.

Q. Have you gotten a chance to reach out to the players on offense, and how much have you worked with them this week, as you move forward?

COACH BRADLEY: That was one of the reasons I didn't want them to think I was always on defense. Yesterday I got a pretty good overview of our offense, how we do things. .

I haven't been on offense since....! guess it was '83 when I coached wide receivers. I wanted to familiarize myself with what we were doing. It was more for the players' benefit, .

I wanted to get around the players. I wanted the offensive players to get to know me. I was going to try to figure out some of their personalities, so they could come to me, talk to me. I don't really have the same relationship that I have with the guys on defense.

So that was one of my concerns. How much I interject on offense, to be honest with you, I've got to really study it a lot more than I've done right now. .

I basically wanted to go over there and just get a feel. And now today I'll go back and forth from the offense to the defense and also with the special teams, because I will work with Anthony Fera.

Mike used to work with our kickers. I used to coach special teams for 15 years. So I'll go back and spend some time with Anthony and field goals and do some of those things again. I'll be all over the place trying to help wherever I can.

If that means coaching the defensive scout team, that's what I'll do. I just want to win the game. I'll do whatever it takes.

Q. Given the upheaval type circumstances that led to your becoming interim coach, do you have a greater appreciation sort of for like what Luke Fickell has had to deal with this season at Ohio State coming in as he did after Jim Tressel?

COACH BRADLEY: When Luke called yesterday, he asked how I was doing. I just started I kind of chuckled. He knew what I meant because he had the same thing. .

And I know Luke. He's a heck of a good person. He's a friend of mine, I've recruited against Luke. We've been on the road together. And he was laughing. He said, "At least I got my start in May,".

So but we did talk about a couple of things we wanted to do for the game. .

Q. Could you address it, it's kind of weird, a Penn State/Ohio State game, both interim coaches, both scandals plaguing the programs this year. What kind of atmosphere do you think there's going to be for this game? COACH BRADLEY: It's still Ohio State-Penn State. One of the things I want to emphasize right now; this is all about the players, it's about our team, their team. It's still football, great atmosphere, college football, playing at the Horseshoe. Doesn't get any better than that.

It's going to be an exciting game. We're both fighting for the title. There's a lot on the line. And it will be a very spirited match regardless of what's going on outside.

Q. Following up on that, given these programs and the traditions and what happened at Miami, if scandals like these can occur at Penn State and Ohio State and Miami, do you have any concern that the image and reputation of college football have been really tarnished through all of these?

COACH BRADLEY: I really don't think so. I think that that's not for me to judge. That's for the other people to do that. But, I don't think so. It's a great game. It's a great sport.

- Q. A lot was made about the moment, both teams came together mid field on Saturday. Is that something that's been discussed? Will that continue with you guys the rest of the year? Was that just for the Nebraska game? COACH BRADLEY: Coach Fickell asked me if there would be something that we would talk about we would do before the game. And we will do something before the game, before we flip....toss the coin.
- Q. Also, have you addressed with the squad the possibility of taking a bowl game, you guys are bowl eligible at this point. Is that something that you would accept if it came your way? COACH BRADLEY: Yes, I want to make it the players and the guys on this team didn't have anything to do with any of this that's surrounding them. I did address that, because there was rumors flowing around that if we make it we won't be able to go

to a bowl game. .

I told them that was untrue. Basically a lot of questions have come up that I've tried to answer with them, being very transparent about what I know, what I hear.

I'll ask the captains: Are there some questions you want me to get answers from our administration, which I do, I call them up. I relay the message to the team. I try to keep them all in the loop and make sure we're all on the same page. .

- Q. You said on Saturday that you hadn't talked to, gone and seen Joe yet, just because he told you to focus on the team. Have you gone and seen him since, or do you have any sense of how he's doing? COACH BRADLEY: No, I have not.
- Q. And obviously the world is talking about the NBC interview last night with Jerry Sandusky. Have you seen it, and do you have any reaction to it?

 COACH BRADLEY: No, I did not. I was working on Ohio State last night. I had other things to do.
- Q. Just a follow up about the bowl game. Has there been any discussion at all, or have you been aware of any discussion about next season, possibly not even playing next season?

 COACH BRADLEY: No, that's never come up, I've been assured by Dr. Erickson; I've talked to Dr. Erickson and he's talked to Commissioner Delany, they've had some dialogue back and forth. And we've been assured that that's not the case for the bowl game. I've never heard that rumor about next season.
- Q. Just another one, with Mike on administrative leave, how are you guys handling recruiting with regard to do you have a recruiting coordinator that's kind of stepped in for him?

 COACH BRADLEY: Bill Kavanaugh will head up our recruiting effort, and Bill, obviously with the signing period, not the signing, but the recruiting period coming up, depending where we are and whether we're playing in the (Big Ten) championship game or not, we have a plan to go out and recruit.
- Q. Have you gotten a lot of talk from the verbals that there's still COACH BRADLEY: What we did, we had a conference (last Thursday) and we gave them the number to call in for any questions so that they were hearing the exact same thing. Our coaches had called. There's a one call a week rule, and we felt that we wanted to make sure they were hearing one voice, that it came out the same way.

What we did was we set up a conference, teleconference number, they could call in and ask questions so that they were hearing it from Mark Sherburne, our Acting Athletic Director, and myself and everybody on the staff, if there was any questions, we answered those questions as a group, so they were sure that everybody was being told the same thing.

Q. What's Silas Redd's status for Saturday? And do you expect Stephfon Green to see some first team time this week?

COACH BRADLEY: Silas came to practice yesterday. He did not run any plays. He's banged up. Silas will not be hit this week, but I'm expecting him to be able to play in the game on Saturday.

Q. In spite of all that's gone on, you still control your own destiny in terms of the championship for the Big Ten. How much have you emphasized that point this week?

COACH BRADLEY: Started the meeting with it yesterday: We still control our own destiny, and we can still win this thing. And I told them what's at stake. And they understand that. They're well aware. We know we have a tough task ahead of us going to Ohio State.

Q. You had said you hadn't met with (Joe) Paterno. Have any of the players met with Paterno? And what is the mood among the players?

COACH BRADLEY: I can't tell if any of the players have met with Coach Paterno or not. I wouldn't know that. You'll have to ask them if they have.

The mood of the players is very upbeat. They've been great. The players have been great at practice. They've been great with what they did. They've been great with the way they handled themselves throughout this whole thing. They've been at practice, I couldn't ask for anything more from a group of young men.

I told them on Saturday before the game I was awful proud of the way they handled themselves. I was proud to be their coach. And I was proud of everything they did. They fought hard on Saturday. But, I let them know there's no moral victories. I let them know the way they kept fighting is the way we're going to keep doing it.

Q. Given the circumstances, is there an importance to getting away this week and getting on the road with all these

guys just out of the environment?

COACH BRADLEY: One of the things when you go on the road you do form a bond with your players, because it's the you against the word attitude out there. There's only 70 players that make the trip. You spend some time together. It's a good chance for them.

And I think it will give me a good chance. I'm try to get around, like today I went down to the weight room, talked to some guys. I'm trying to get around, make sure I'm not missing anything.

I met with the freshmen last night in study half at 7:30 to make sure we emphasize a lot of times you tend to forget about the redshirt players that aren't involved. I can't let the academics slip through the cracks. I wanted to make sure we were on the same page.

They had questions about the off week. Next week we're off (from classes). And some guys had some question why I had mandatory a 10 to 12 (10 a.m.-12 p.m.) study hall. So I explained that to them.

And I just wanted to hear their questions, because often their voices are not heard. They're the young freshmen on the team, some not playing, not involved, and they have questions and concerns that they wanted answered. And I met with them last night.

Q. You mentioned that you hadn't seen Joe Paterno yet. Can you talk about why you haven't seen him, and whether you do plan to see him in the very near future?

COACH BRADLEY: I do plan to see Coach. As I said last week, in the meeting, Coach and I had a brief discussion. I called him up the next day. I knew what he was going to say. I'll just repeat it.

I knew the minute I asked the question; Coach, can I talk you? "You have enough things to do." I could have put the down. I knew the answer whether it was: "Why are you coming over here, wasting your time?" I know the answer.

If I call him today, he's going to ask why am I calling him. "What are you calling me for? You've got things to do." He's been through this. He understands all the things that have to be done with a big game coming up, and these players are excited for the game and the responsibility that we have, not only to Penn State but to the player, to the parents.

All the things we've promised academically what we're going to do, to their high school coaches, to everybody that's involved with that kid.

We made a commitment, and we're going to follow through on that commitment. And as I told the players, the slogan around here is: The expectations are the expectations.

They have not changed. And I'm going to make sure they understand that and understand the ramifications of what, the way we're headed here and how we're going to do things. And I made it perfectly clear that if you step out of line, I'm coming down quick and fast and hard...

So they all know the stance of what we're doing and as far as Coach, you know, I've been with Coach a long time. I know exactly what he's going to say and what he's going to do. And I'm sure there will be a time at some point that I'll want to sit down with coach and talk, but right now he knows we have a bigger task at hand.

Q. How unsettling is it to you and to your players that Mike McQueary is no longer on the coaching staff, he's away from the team, and he really hasn't had a chance to address why he's away from the team? COACH BRADLEY: Well, one of the things that I do and they'll probably tell you this anything I hear I communicate with them. I try to be as up front as possible with any information.

I address the point I got a call last week. I think Jeff you called me, was Mike in protective custody or something. I said no, I know where he is. We squelched that rumor.

Anything that comes up, there's certain things I can't answer because of legalities or things of that nature. But I do want to keep them informed.

I talk to them all the time about their Twitter accounts, Facebook accounts. "Guys, understand people are monitoring your accounts. So let's make sure that you that we keep this whole thing, what you say and what people get from your stuff, that we keep it up front." I like tell some of them if it's okay for your mother to read, then it's okay to put on there. But if you don't think you want your mother to read it, don't put it on there. But I think everybody understands the situation.

Q. Is it your understanding that Mike McQueary's days as a coach here are over?

COACH BRADLEY: I can't answer that question due to what's going on with the university, any on-going investigation and things. I know the players understand that Mike the situation as best I could describe it to the team. They understand I've asked them for their patience as we try to work this out and make some changes.

It's a lot of, when you change coaches, there's personalities, bring in guys that are uncomfortable. I'm trying to keep things everything as close to normal as I can for them.

Q. The Shoe hasn't been a real hospitable place for you guys. Can you talk about the challenges of playing there and the challenges that this Ohio State team represents for you guys, what you see COACH BRADLEY: The Shoe hasn't been a great place for us. We've only won there, what, in '78, I believe, and in 2008 when we went out there (and won).

It's been a tough place for us. We haven't played our best games out there. But you know every year is different it's a new team. I don't worry about the past. I'm only worried about the present right now.

Q. It's been six days since this scandal, since Joe got fired. How has it affected your team? How have you been able to they have to be hearing everything that's going on. How much of a distraction has that been for your team? COACH BRADLEY: I'm sure it's a distraction. The one thing I've tried to do is communication. I'm getting around to everybody I possibly can. I'm spending time with them. I'm trying to talk to our captains. We've got great leadership on this team.

I'm just trying to communicate with them. And there's questions they have. If anybody has a question, hey, they know where my office is. They know my cell phone number. They know how to get ahold of me.

I just want to make sure I'm keeping everybody on the same page. And if I don't know the answer I'm going to say, "I don't know the answer. I will find out." And I think the one thing I always try to do with my players is I try to tell them the truth. They may not want to hear the truth, but that's what I try to do with them.

Q. Have you heard any reservations from your assistant coaches about using the assistant coaches locker room shower?

COACH BRADLEY: I've never heard that come up ever. .

Q. The players aren't available for comment this week. Are you just trying to get them away from the crush of media and whatnot?

COACH BRADLEY: The purpose of that was probably a two fold deal. We're getting into, with all the different questions, a lot of them aren't sure how to answer the questions, are getting badgered with questions. They'll answer any Ohio State questions you have. If you see our players, you want to talk about Ohio State, they'll answer the questions. They're not sure how to answer some of the other questions. They're not they don't know a whole lot about it.

Q. With Mike's e mails and Jerry talking last night, does it bother you that Coach Paterno hasn't gotten to give his side of the story yet?

COACH BRADLEY: Whether it's fair or not is not for me to decide. I did not see Mike's e mail. I don't have a copy of it. I want to be honest with everybody here. This group, this staff has been focused on Ohio State. It was well after midnight before most of the guys got out of there last night. And they know it's a big game and they're doing everything they can to help the players.

Like I said, that's up to Coach Paterno. That's not my decision. .

- Q. You mentioned you guys would accept a bowl bid. How concerned are you that bowls may not want Penn State; and what would you tell those bowls about perhaps what Penn State could offer if they would invite you? COACH BRADLEY: Once again, that's not my decision. That's the administration's decision. So whatever they decide, that's what we'll do...
- Q. I understand that you tried to get Mike McQueary on the phone during either before or during, after Saturday's game, and there was some interference with the telephone here in the stadium. What was the purpose of that call? What did you want to accomplish with that?

COACH BRADLEY: Only to call to ask him if he's okay. And I had the same concerns about Jay, I asked Jay too, I said, "Jay, are you all right? Are you okay with what we're doing?" It was a tough day for him, too. I think to be fair to everybody I owe them a call and I owe them to make sure they're safe and to make sure that it was a very emotional day for Jay and I wanted to make sure he was good, too.

JQ. For the first time this season Matt is listed as the outright starter with no OR. Is that what you plan on

COACH BRADLEY: It's my decision. .

Q. Do you plan on doing that for the rest of the season, then? COACH BRADLEY: It depends game to game. Right now Malt's the starter.

Q. How do you compare where Braxton Miller is as a freshman to where Terrelle Pryor was as a freshman, what's it going to be like to game plan for him?

COACH BRADLEY: I actually got a text message from Terrelle. Braxton is an excellent quarterback. He does a lot of different things, a lot like Terrelle. He's awful good in open field and space. He's quick. He's an excellent football player.

He's really, as you watch him from game to game he's gotten better each and every game. He's obviously got an outstanding future ahead of him, .

That offensive football team they have is pretty good. The names -- Shugarts and Brewster and Adams and Posey is back this wook, And it's Brown. We know the names. It's a heck of a football team. That offensive fine of theirs has been around for a long time, Big time group. And so we'll have our hands full. Miller just adds to it because he adds another dimension with his great athleticism.

Q. Would you be able to share what Terrelle's message may have been? Did he offer you support? Did you offer him support with everything that they went through?

COACH BRADLEY: Terrelle and I have texted back and forth periodically a couple of times. He just offered me his support. I don't know if that meant support at The Shoe, but up until then I had his support.

Q. What will be your role on offense? Will you call some plays? Will you decide on when COACH BRADLEY: No, I'm just going to be there to help. And I've talked to them about that. If there's anything I can help, there's certain things you want me to watch, certain things you want me to help you guys in any way because I'm freed up on what I did on defense, what I did between series there. I'm just there to help and see anything I can do to help the team win, I'll do it.

Q. Have you gotten any feedback from the AD or anyone about your future or anyone on the assistant coaching staff past this season, have you heard anything at all?
COACH BRADLEY: I have not heard anything at all...

Q. Have you asked?
COACH BRADLEY: I haven't asked. They basically asked me to do a job and that's what I plan on doing. I told my players: Players play and coaches coach and administrators administrate. And that's their decision.

Q. I know you were planning on having a call with all the current players, their parents. What was that call like and what are some of the concerns you're hearing from them?
COACH BRADLEY: Basically we wanted to make sure that we were it actually turned out to be a very positive experience. It wasn't like it was a witch-hunt where they were asking why we were playing different people.

They had some questions regarding a tot of different things. I'm actually thinking about instituting maybe once every two weeks we have those, whether it be an academic information (session) for the parents, when we go to a bowl game, what we expect from the players....

There's a whole bunch of different areas that we can communicate better with our parents, be more transparent. So they understand I want them to be on the same page, want them all to hear the same thing. We give them an opportunity, we give them a number to call in, they can call in and field their questions, and they've been good questions about all different things. And I just want to make sure that we continue on that path.

Q. You said that you didn't watch the NBC interview last night with Jerry Sandusky. How would you characterize your relationship with Jerry Sandusky and how would you describe him as a person? COACH BRADLEY: I'm not going to go there. I was watching Ohio State, and I've got more important things right now.

Q. I was just wondering if you were able to share what the team's planning on doing before the game? COACH BRADLEY: You know, last week when they decided to do, I left it up to them. As you know, I did not come out with the team. I won't come out with the team again this weekend. I told them what I expect them to do, and they've been very good about it.

It thought I knew what they would do would be very classy. I'm not quite sure what they will do when they come out this week.
But I'm okay with them doing it as long as it's in good taste. And, you know, they came out for unity, they came out for the

victims, they came out for Penn State. They came out as a group. They came out together. They signified what they were all about.

Penn State wide receivers coach Mike McQueary allegedly witnessed Jerry Sandusky performing a sexual act on a young child in a Lasch Football Building shower in 2002...and didn't intervene.

This detail is in the grand jury report about the scandal surrounding Sandusky and Penn State University.

McQueary is a coward. If he feared for his job on that day, he should fear for more than that in the coming days.

An Aspiring Coach in the Middle of a Scandal

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. - When Mike McQueary went to Penn State Coach Joe Paterno's house on the morning of March 2, 2002, he was a graduate assistant — the lowest rung on the coaching ladder beneath Paterno. Still, McQueary, 28 years old and a football lifer, had aspirations of one day becoming a head coach, maybe even at Penn State.

A former quarterback for Paterno, he had once been a fan attraction for his shock of bright orange hair and his State College roots. Popular and known for an easygoing, collegial manner, he was beginning the baby steps toward his dream job.

Nine years later, what McQueary told Paterno at that meeting — he had seen a former senior football coach molesting a young boy in the football building's showers — has figured prominently in the most ignominious episode in university history.

On Wednesday night, Paterno, who had hoped to remain as coach for the final three games of the season, was fired. Graham B. Spanier, the highly regarded and long-serving president of Penn State, was removed. Penn State's athletic director has already been charged by the authorities. The campus is in turmoil. And there is a football game Saturday that could determine the team's season.

In an ugly episode that has torn at the soul of a proud university, set off criminal investigations and ended the career of one of the sport's most accomplished and revered coaches, McQueary has occupied among the strangest of positions: he could be the star witness in the coming criminal cases against senior officials at the university; he has become the target for widespread criticism for not having acted more decisively himself nine years ago; and he could well be on the sideline Saturday for the game against Nebraska, helping execute a game plan devised by the coach he once dreamed he might succeed. A Penn State victory would leave it in position to reach a major bowl game.

Jerry Sandusky, a former defensive coordinator under Paterno, has been charged with sexually abusing eight young boys over a 15-year-period. According to findings laid out by state investigators, only two Penn State employees were known to have witnessed Sandusky committing a sex crime: a janitor, who now has dementia and is not competent to testify, and McQueary.

"It's not that he's not willing," John J. McQueary, his father, said about his son's public silence. "I think it's eating him up not to be able to tell his side, but he's under investigation by the grand jury. He'll make it. He's a tough kid."

McQueary's parents, John and Anne, moved the family to State College when Mike was 6 and immediately bought season tickets for Nittany Lions football games. A former medical corpsman with the Navy's special warfare operations, John became a physician assistant, and later, the chief operating officer of a large medical and surgical group in State College. He was also a renowned coach in the State College area himself in youth sports.

When Mike turned 13, his father talked the Penn State quarterback, John Shaffer, into coming by Mike's birthday party to throw a football with him. As a gift, Shaffer threw Mike a new football as he left the party.

Tom Cestone, who lives on the cul-de-sac where the McQuearys raised their family, said his principal recollection of Mike was that he was always playing football in the yard. "He was a fiery kid," Cestone said.

Another neighbor, 87-year-old Virginia Walker, said she also recalled Mike playing football with friends. "He comes from a close family, a nice family," she said. "He's a real decent kid, and he's always been somewhat of a leader."

In high school, McQueary was a star, and as a senior he led the State College Area High football team to a 13-1 record.

"He set high standards for himself and he was stellar in his attitude, his principles and his goals," said Ron Pavlechko, who was the State College Area football coach for 19 years and later became the school's athletic director.

McQueary's final high school game was a loss in the state Class AAAA semifinal, the only game Paterno saw McQueary play in high school. Years later, McQueary said he thought he won Paterno's support for a football scholarship in that hardfought defeat.

"I think that was the game where he said, 'This kid's all right, at least he's tough,' "McQueary said of Paterno in an interview with The Philadelphia Daily News in 1997.

Pavlechko, who played football at Penn State, said he thought McQueary stayed home for other reasons. "Around here, a lot of kids look at Penn State as the epitome of their goals," Pavlechko said.

For four years at Penn State, McQueary was known only as the big redheaded kid who held a clipboard on the sideline. He redshirted his freshman year, then played behind Kerry Collins for a year and Wally Richardson for two. He remained a positive influence, teammates said, despite the lack of playing time. Each Thanksgiving, he invited teammates who could not go home to his family's house. Football players are hefty eaters, and John and Anne McQueary's home became known for its mammoth annual feast.

McQueary finally got his chance to start as a senior in 1997, with Penn State opening the season ranked No. 1. He set a team record for passing yards in his first game, and Penn State won its first seven games. The Nittany Lions stumbled to a 9-3

final record, although McQueary's final home game was a 35-10 win in which he threw three touchdown passes.

"If I could have dreamt it, it couldn't have been better," McQueary said after the game.

Undrafted by the N.F.L., he kicked around pro training camps without landing a roster spot until, in 1999, he returned to Penn State to help with recruiting. Working toward a master's degree in education administration, he joined the coaching staff the next season as a graduate assistant.

But on Friday, March 1, 2002, in an episode that those close to McQueary say left him shocked and confused — and that would return to haunt his life and the fortunes of his university years later — he entered the locker room in Penn State's Lasch Football Building at about 9:30 p.m. to put a new pair of shoes in his locker and pick up some recruiting tapes, according to the report of the grand jury that investigated the allegations involving Sandusky. Coaches commonly keep late hours but not so much in the off-season months, like March. Besides, the lights were not on in the offices, but toward the locker room. That is not usual. And a shower was running.

According to the report, McQueary heard "rhythmic, slapping sounds," which he believed to be those of sexual activity. He walked to his locker, opened it and put his sneakers inside. He then turned his head and looked into the shower.

He has said under oath that he saw Sandusky raping what appeared to be a 10-year-old boy. He immediately left, met with his father and determined he would report the incident to Paterno, according to prosecutors. A person familiar with his account said McQueary did not spare the details when he met with Paterno. Nor did he when he met with the university's athletic director and another senior administrator, the man in charge of Penn State's campus police.

Weeks later, according to state prosecutors, those officials told McQueary that Sandusky had been barred from bringing children onto campus.

To date, it is unclear whether McQueary was satisfied or outraged. But there is no evidence that he did anything else to see Sandusky more meaningfully investigated or punished.

What he did do was continue his climb up the ranks of Paterno's coaching staff.

By 2004, he was named the wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator in a staff shakeup after a dreadful 3-9 season. He replaced Jay Paterno, Joe's son, as recruiting coordinator, and when the 2005 team went 11-1, a boost in the program's recruited talent was lauded for the turnaround.

Over time, still so visible on the sideline because of his red hair, McQueary came to be known as the coach Paterno yelled at when things went wrong. He was often at Paterno's side, relaying plays called from the coaches' box upstairs to the quarterback on the field.

"Everyone wants to know what Coach is saying to me when he's yelling at me," McQueary, who is married with a young daughter, told a Pennsylvania newspaper in August. "It's really everything under the sun. It's something different every time. Coach has a knack for saying things or thinking about things during the course of a game that some of us aren't thinking about. It's like anything you do in life. If you're not emotional, animated or intense about it, then why do it?"

At about that time, in an interview with The New York Times Magazine, McQueary said he dreamed of one day coaching the Nittany Lions, then added, "But Joe will probably outlive me."

In the last few months, after injuries to Paterno, who is 84, relegated him to watch games from the coaches' box, he chose to communicate with one coach on the sideline via a headset: McQueary, his long-time-ago graduate assistant.

Penn State and Joe Paterno: A scandal that so easily could have been avoided

Don't weep for Joe Paterno. If he really loved Penn State as much as he professed, he'd have fallen on his own sword a lot sooner, rather than letting the situation on campus reach a boiling point while trying to engineer his own retirement. If he loved kids as much as he professed, then he'd love all kids, not just the ones who attend Penn State, but also the ones who allegedly were lured there to see football games and ended up being raped and fondled in the showers. If he wanted to save his school and his program and even his friend from the firestorm engulfing them all now, all he had to do was pick up the phone dial 9-1-1. Three digits.

When Paterno asked the students rallying on his behalf to pray for the victims, that's when I knew his time was up. Pray for the victims? Sure, go ahead, it can't hurt. Just realize you can't give them back their innocence, their trust in adults, their childhoods.

But also be prepared to counsel them, to offer them the help and support that should have come years ago, and to write some big, fat checks. Because this university will be hit with a class action lawsuit, and hard. See also: Church, Catholic.

You look at Paterno and you see the thick glasses and the grandfatherly face and you may feel pity. I do, too. I pity his complete lack of understanding for the damage he has wrought. For nine years, by failing to take decisive action, a predator was allowed to remain free. When I look at Paterno, I think of a lot of innocent children who are no longer innocent.

Penn State's board of trustees fired both Paterno and school president Graham Spanier on Wednesday night, further cleaning house in the wake of a grand jury investigation into child sex abuse allegations against Jerry Sandusky, Paterno's former assistant.

"range, isn't it, this particular scandal? It's not shoes or tattoos or parties with Ponzi-scheming hangers-on. No money hanged hands; no AAU coach profited. And yet, despite the cynicism that builds up after nearly 30 years in this business, I have been so angry, so heartsick since Saturday that I can hardly think of anything else. Am I the only one?

Not all of those boys could have been saved. The very first ones — the ones we still don't know about and probably never will, because they were victims before anyone suspected anything — those boys likely are lost. Predators start slow, and are often spected men. They usually don't get caught on their first try. We do know that Sandusky started Second Mile, a group foster ... me that grew into a charity for underprivileged kids, in 1977, and he didn't resign until 2010. That in itself is amazing.

Because in 1998, finally, a child had the courage to tell his mother what happened to him in those showers, and his mother called university police. The investigation was closed after the Centre County district attorney's office refused to file criminal charges. However, the notion that Second Mile and Penn State officials knew nothing of an investigation done under their noses strains credulity. The next year, Sandusky resigned his assistant's job. But he still had full access to campus. He still had access to the bait.

Even though the signs were there in 1998, no one stopped him. But in 2002, when grad assistant Mike McQueary allegedly walked in on that horrible scene in the showers, on campus, right there it could have stopped. That child, and every child that came after, could have been saved. I don't care whether Sandusky never came back to the campus showers again. That doesn't mean he stopped. Predators *do not stop*.

All it would have taken is a phone call to 9-1-1. Three little digits. Three little numbers, and that boy's life might have been changed. Other boys' lives might have been changed. Sandusky's life certainly would have been changed. And Penn State wouldn't be leaderless this morning.

'tead, McQueary left and called . . . his dad. McQueary was not a child, or an 18-year-old freshman. He was a 28-year-old, presumably of good health and strong build. Yet he walked away? When I was 28, I probably still called my dad if I had a perplexing question about my tax return, but if I saw a naked man raping a young boy in the showers, I would have dialed 9-1-1, pulled the man off the boy, incapacitated the man with a well-placed and much-enjoyed knee to the groin, and gotten the boy out of there.

Isn't that what anyone in his right mind would do if he saw someone being raped? I certainly hope our world hasn't fallen so far into the Slough of Despond that seeing forcible sex acts performed on a child isn't something we shrug off. This is the sort of thing for which 911 was invented.

But for whatever reason, McQueary didn't do those things, nor did his father call 9-1-1. Opportunity No. 2, wasted. Instead, they went to see Paterno the next day. Again, no phone call. Goodbye, Opportunity No. 3. And Paterno's report up the chain of command was so unlike what the grand jury report says McQueary described to athletic director Tim Curley and vice president Gray Schultz that it was like a bad game of Telephone. According to the grand jury report, Paterno described what McQueary told him as Sandusky "fondling or doing something of a sexual nature to a young boy." The same report says McQueary described it to Curley and Schultz as "anal sex." Maybe Paterno didn't believe it; maybe McQueary wasn't clear.

nd that's why Paterno is gone. Yes, yes, he followed the chain of command and reported the incident to his superior, as did mcQueary, so he followed the rules. McQueary was later told, according to the report, that Sandusky's locker room keys had been taken and the incident had been reported to Second Mile. This was Opportunity No. 4, in my opinion, because this was

McQueary's chance to make the call. It was clear no one had contacted anyone with actual authority. Might McQueary have lost his job? Yes. Is letting a child be raped and doing nothing worth a line on your résumé? I would say no. Wouldn't you?

I flourishes when good men do nothing. And at Penn State, a lot of men — good or not — did nothing when one of the greatest evils imaginable was perpetrated against some of the most defenseless among us.

When the dust settles in State College and the board of trustees begins to rebuild the university hierarchy, I am sure it will institute myriad changes in an effort to ensure nothing like this ever happens again. The easiest would be this: If you see a crime being perpetrated, do not send it up the chain of command. Of all the stupid rules that were followed at Penn State, that was the stupidest.

Crime happens, even in a place called Happy Valley. Letting football coaches and college administrators decide how to deal with it is as ridiculous as letting campus security run the football program. If a simple phone call had been made nine years ago, there would have been repercussions, but nothing like we're seeing this week. Joe Paterno would have retired with his reputation intact. And more important — so much more important — a lot of children might have been spared. Just by dialing three digits. Dear God, just three little digits.

Of all of the horrifying images conjured up by the grand jury's report on former Penn State defensive coordinator Jerry Sandusky,

Grand-Jury-Presentment.pdf) none is worse than the one that emerged from the school's tocker room showers on March 1st, 2002.

A graduate assistant, who was unnamed in the grand jury's report, walked into the Lasch Football building at about 9:30pm. Upon entering the locker room, the then-28-year-old assistant heard "stapping sounds" that he thought sounded like people having sex. Then:

"HE SAW A NAKED BOY, VICTIM 2, WHOSE AGE HE ESTIMATED TO BE 10 YEARS OLD, WITH HIS HANDS UP AGAINST THE WALL, BEING SUBJECTED TO ANAL INTERCOURSE BY A NAKED [JERRY] SANDUSKY."

With his hands up against a wail.

The eyewitness has been identified as Mike McQueary, a former Nittany Lion quarterback who now serves as an assistant coach for the toam. In a press conference held earlier today, interim coach Tom Bradley announced that McQueary will be coaching for Penn State this weekend (http://bracking.si.com/2011/11/10/mike-mcqueary-will-coachior-penn-state-this-weekend-against-netraska/). Whether he'll be on the sidelinss or not will be a game-time decision, but he'll coach. He shouldn't, nor should he ever coach again.

On that night in 2002, instead of intervening, McQueary left the locker room. Shocked, he went into a nearby office, and cailed his dad. His dad told him to get out of there. The next day, they both went to Joe Paterno's house and told Paterno what happened. JoePa went to his superiors, no one did anything, and the boy in the shower was never found or identified.

So what do you at that moment when you're McQueary?
There's a right thing to do, which is to physically intervene,
maybe even beat Sandusky up right there in the shower. This
is the thing that most people,

c=r) miles and years away from all of this, like to think they
would've done, myself included.

Maybe he was shocked by the actual, physical horror that was unfolding in front of firm, or maybe he was shocked because the guy who was doing it was Jerry Sandusky, a man who coached on the teams he played for in the 90s, in any event, the biggest fight or flight response that Mike McQueary will likely ever have to face kicked in at that moment. He fled, and he's going to have to deal with that forever.



Who knows what was going through his head that night. McQueary's life was Penn State, the football institution, and what was going on in front of him likely meant the end of whatever that institution represented to him. I doubt that there's more terrifying way your world can come crashing down then walking in on a major pillar of that world raping a child. But he shouldn't coach on Saturday. He shouldn't

I know that no one, regardless of how tough they talk, could possibly be prepared for what Mike McQueary walked in on in that locker room.

But the worst thing isn't the inaction of McQueary in the moment. The worst thing is the ensuing inaction. Because after he didn't do anything, and it was apparent that no one else was doing anything, he continued to do nothing. For days, and weeks, and morths, while Jerry Sandusky was still having sleepovers with kids and that boy from the shower remained unidentified, he did nothing. Then, in the ensuing years as an assistant coach whose primary duty was recruiting, he lied. He went into players' homes, tooked thair parents in the eye, and tot them that Penn State was a good place to piay, it wasn't, which is something we didn't know

The shaming of McQueary is a sheme in of itself, because the guilt he's reportedly carrying with him right now is crushing. (http://www.post-gazette.com/pg/11313/1186543-298.stm)But that shame, which is only going to get worse in the coming months, won't be without reason.

The prolonged and systemic deconstruction of McQueary's life will serve as a lesson for the next grown man or woman that knows a child is being sexually abused, whether right in front of their face, or somewhere in their midst. They'll know that if they do what McQueary did that night in the showers, and what he did in the ensuing years — which is nothing — their life will be ruined, in addition to the young lives that are being ruined around them. And if even one kid is saved because of that, then the hell that Mike McQueary is about to go through will have served its purpose.

Last Man Standing

Mike McQueary says that he saw Jerry Sandusky sexually assault a child. Why does he still have a job at Penn State?

On March 1, 2002, Mike McQueary allegedly walked into the Penn State locker room and saw Jerry Sandusky raping a young boy. According to the **grand jury report in the Sandusky case**, McQueary—then a 28-year-old graduate assistant for the Nittany Lions football team—"left immediately, distraught." McQueary then called his father, who advised him to tell coach Joe Paterno what he'd seen. He did as his father advised, and a short while later, he told Penn State's athletic director Tim Curley and administrator Gary Schultz as well. A few weeks later, the report explains, Curley told McQueary "that Sandusky's keys to the locker room were taken away and that the incident had been reported to The Second lile," Sandusky's nonprofit for at-risk children. Until he testified before the grand jury, that's where the story ended for Mike McQueary. He was never interviewed by Penn State police, and he never reported Sandusky's actions to any other agency.

In the week since we've learned of Sandusky's horrible crimes and Penn State's negligence in reporting them, almost everyone who could conceivably have done anything to stop the alleged child molester has resigned or been dismissed. Paterno is out. So are Curley and hultz and Penn State President Graham Spanier. But Mike McQueary, now Penn State's receivers coach, still has a job, and as of Thursday afternoon, he's supposed to coach in Saturday's football game against Nebraska. [Update, 11/10/2011, 10:45 p.m.: Penn State has announced that McQueary will not be at Saturday's game, explaining that the school has received "multiple threats" against the coach.] [Update, 11/11/2011, 7:10 p.m.: McQueary has now reportedly been placed on administrative leave. He also reportedly told his players that he is no longer their coach and that he is in "protective custody."] How you feel about McQueary's job status depends on how you choose to parcel out blame. Do you find the most fault with a man who witnessed a disgusting criminal act and didn't report it to the police? Or do you believe it's fair to punish those at the top of Penn State's chain of command most harshly?

Mike McQueary made the wrong choice. He—like so many others at Penn State and elsewhere—could have helped put an end to Sandusky's abuse many years ago. Why didn't he? He was the low man on the football staff, a **grad assistant** making little money whose 'est hope of advancement was to ingratiate himself to his superiors. McQueary was also a **rmer Penn State starting quarterback** who grew up in State College, Pa. He played for, worked for, and no doubt idolized Joe Paterno and perhaps Jerry Sandusky, too. When he allegedly saw Sandusky raping a boy in the shower, McQueary shouldn't have just called the police—he should have rescued the boy. But I can understand why someone in his position, with his background, would have run out of the room immediately and called his father.

In the grand jury report, there's one more instance in which a low-level employee didn't act as bravely as he could have. In 2000, a temp janitor named Jim Calhoun allegedly saw Sandusky—a man he didn't recognize—performing oral sex on a boy in the Penn State showers. According to one of Calhoun's colleagues, the janitor, who was "upset and crying," said that he had "fought in the [Korean] war ... seen people with their guts blowed out, arms dismembered ... I just witnessed something in there I'll never forget." Calhoun told his immediate supervisor what he'd seen, and the supervisor "told him to whom he should aport the incident, if he chose to report it." Calhoun never made an official report, and he wasn't able to testify in front of the grand jury because he now suffers from dementia.

As Luke O'Brien pointed out on Deadspin, what happened at Penn State is a modern version of the Kitty Genovese case, the 1964 rape and murder in which the victim's neighbors didn't call the police. The Penn State case, though, seems even worse: While it's unclear how much Genovese's neighbors saw and heard, at least two people allegedly saw Sandusky sexually assault a young boy and many more heard about it secondhand. As a consequence, this seems like a better example of "Genovese syndrome" than the attack that inspired that coinage. Nobody at Penn State, from the janitor to the university president, stood up and did the right thing. Those at the top of the school's org chart were protecting the institution, the program, and their own high-status positions. Those at the bottom were protecting their livelihoods, likely hoping that someone else would be courageous enough to do what they could not.

the end, it's possible to comprehend Mike McQueary's actions but impossible to rationalize them. Though turning in your superiors is a very difficult thing to do-there's a federal Whistleblower Protection Act for good reason—in this case it was the only thing to do. McQueary has yet to talk publicly; his father told the New York Times that "it's eating [McQueary] up not to be able to tell his side, but he's under investigation by the grand jury." No matter what he eventually says, this fact remains: For almost 10 years after McQueary allegedly saw Sandusky raping a child in the shower, the former Penn State defensive coordinator had access to the school's football facilities. McQueary, like Paterno and Penn State's administrators, didn't have just one chance to turn Sandusky in. He could have gone to the police at any time. And yet, he watched as the old coach used the team's weight room as recently as last week.

So, does McQueary deserve as much blame as Penn State President Graham Spanier? Probably not. Does he deserve a significant share of it, having stood by when a predator could have been put away? Absolutely.

Dear Attorney Conrad:

I was retained to serve as an expert in the area of employment of football coaching on behalf of The Pennsylvania State University (PSU) and to render an opinion regarding claims by Michael McQueary that he was wrongfully denied the opportunity to continue coaching at PSU following the appointment of a new head coach in 2012, as well as McQueary's claims that he cannot obtain employment as a collegiate football coach because of the acts and omissions by PSU.

For the reasons that follow, it is my opinion, Michael McQueary would not have been retained as a coach at PSU following the appointment of Bill O'Brien as head coach. Additionally, McQueary's failure to obtain employment after the expiration of his contract with PSU is the result of his own failure to develop his professional coaching experience and his failure to properly network. I state these opinions with a reasonable degree of certainty.

Background

My start in football began at the Newman School, where the quarterback was Eli Manning. From there, my professional career launched as a student assistant for the University of Mississippi's football program. After graduating from Ole Miss, I became a defensive assistant at Stanford University. I later returned to my alma mater after receiving an offer to join the offensive coaching staff. After a season at Ole Miss, the head coach was unexpectedly fired. I was not expected to be

retained by the new head coach, as is common in football. Based on the relationship I had developed with the head coach at the University of Memphis, I was offered a position there as an offensive graduate assistant. I remained at the University of Memphis for two seasons before moving on to become special teams coordinator at Samford University.

In 2008, I transitioned out of coaching and bought the website FootballScoop.com. Within a few short years, the website became a preeminent source of breaking news about coaching transactions (hires and fires) in college and professional football. I later created another website, CoachingSearch.com, which remains the leader in coaching news and a trusted resource among coaches and athletic directors. The success of both websites was entirely dependent on developing trusting relationships with coaches.

In 2012, I created Coaching Search Consulting, Inc., specializing in developing career solutions for coaches, including resume development and networking. I was instrumental in assisting clients obtain positions as coaches, coordinators and assistants in both college and professional football.

In 2014, I joined Coaches Consulting Group, a sports agency, where I serve as Vice President of Coaching Operations. Today, I represent more than twenty (20) college football coaches, including four (4) head coaches.

I have also worked with the Manning Passing Academy every summer since 1999. The Academy is the premier offensive football skills camp in the country for quarterbacks, running backs, tight ends and wide receivers and provides additional networking opportunities.

Materials Reviewed

In preparing this report, I relied upon the extensive knowledge I have gained as a coach, reporter, employment consultant and agent. I also relied on the statistical data I have accumulated in the last decade regarding college coaching transactions.

In addition, I reviewed numerous documents concerning McQueary's lawsuit against PSU, including but not limited to:

- 1. The October 2, 2012 Complaint filed by Michael McQueary against PSU;
- 2. The Answer to McQueary's Complaint filed by PSU on May 3, 2013;
- 3. The deposition testimony of Michael McQueary from February 29, 2016 and March 1, 2016;
- 4. Michael McQueary's resumes in which he describes his professional and playing experience, as well as his educational background;
- 5. The deposition testimony of Tom Bradley, current Defensive Coordinator at the University of California Los Angeles (UCLA) and former Defense Coordinator and 2012 *interim* Head Coach at PSU;
- 6. The deposition testimony of Matt Rhule, current Head Coach at Temple University;
- 7. The testimony of Brett Senior, who assisted Michael McQueary in connection with his coaching activities.
- 8. The report prepared by James A. Stravros, CPA, CFF at the request of Michael McQueary; and
- 9. The report prepared by John C. Parry at the request of Michael McQueary.

College Coaching Selections

My entire professional life has revolved around college football and I am most familiar with the system by which head coaches select their staff.

As a preliminary matter, when a new head coach is hired, no one from the former staff should assume that they will be retained. In most circumstances, the new head coach will replace the staff with his own selections. There can be exceptions to this general rule, but those exceptions are reserved for coaches whose credentials make them sought after by teams across the country.

In general, when a head coach selects his staff, he will evaluate a candidate's ability to:

- 1. Recruit new talent;
- 2. Develop players;
- 3. Strengthen the offense or defense; and
- 4. Fit.

Fit is of utmost importance. A head coach must be confident that a candidate will contribute positively to a team's chemistry. Head coaches often seek candidates who they are personally familiar with to ensure a good fit. For instance, a head coach will often select an individual he has coached or has coached with in the past because that leads to trust.

Alternatively, a head coach may rely on the recommendations and connections of those he trusts in the industry. This is why networking is of vital importance. The most sought after candidates not only have tremendous talent in the areas above, but they also take the time to broaden and strengthen their networks. Growing a web of connections outside a coach's team can be accomplished by attending national conventions, camps and clinics.

EMPLOYMENT ASSESSMENT OF MICHAEL MCQUEARY

Michael McQueary should have recognized it was highly unlikely that he would be retained at PSU when Bill O'Brien was appointed the new head coach.

There was nothing remarkable about McQueary's resume that warranted retaining him as the wide receivers coach, or in any other capacity for that matter.

In addition, the evidence indicates that McQueary failed to build a network he could rely upon to connect him with coaching opportunities. McQueary spent his entire career insulated at PSU. In this day and age, it is rare for a coach to stay at an institution for more than a decade. There is little evidence that McQueary made any substantial effort to build a network during his time at PSU.

Further limiting McQueary's network, was the fact there was minimal turnover under Coach Paterno. As a result, McQueary had limited connections with different coaches outside of PSU that could vouch for his abilities.

McQueary's shortfalls may be best illustrated by looking at Stan Hixon, the wide receivers coach who Coach O'Brien selected for his coaching staff. Hixon's

coaching history spans more than thirty (30) years. Before joining PSU, Hixon had been the wide receivers coach for the Washington Redskins for six (6) seasons and for the Buffalo Bills for two (2) seasons. Before his professional football coaching positions, Hixon coached at six different colleges and universities across the country. Not only did Hixon have extensive experience, but he had coached with O'Brien at Georgia Tech for half a decade. To say that Hixon was qualified would be an understatement and that is true of all of O'Brien's coaching selections while at PSU.

In addition to his shortfalls, McQueary made minimal effort to transition to another college coaching program. In 2011 and 2012 there were 120 football programs in the National College Athletic Association's (NCAA) Division I-A. Out of those 120 programs, fifty-three (53) saw changes in their wide receiver coaches between 2011 and 2012. See Exhibit A. That means there were fifty-three (53) opportunities for McQueary to seek another position as a wide receiver coach within Division I-A in the year after his contract expired with PSU. These numbers do not take into account the numerous other job opportunities available in the Division I-AA level. Nor do they take into account, the hundreds of other offensive coaching opportunities available that year and in the years since.

CONCLUSION

For all of these reasons, no matter the circumstance, it is highly unlikely that Michael McQueary would have been retained as a coach at PSU following the appointment of Bill O'Brien as head coach. Moreover, McQueary's failure to obtain employment after the expiration of his contract with PSU is the result of his own failure to develop his professional coaching experience and his failure to properly network. I state these opinions with a reasonable degree of certainty.

At your request, we have calculated estimates of the potential economic loss to Michael McQueary as a result of his separation from employment as an assistant football coach with The Pennsylvania State University (PSU) on June 30, 2012.¹

Background²

Michael McQueary was born on October 10, 1974, is divorced and resides in State College, Pennsylvania. In 1997, he graduated from PSU with a BS in health policy. He also earned 30 credit hours towards a Master of Education Administration degree. Mr. McQueary was a quarterback for the PSU football team. During his tenure as an employee with the PSU football program, Mr. McQueary worked as an administrative assistant (1999-2000, 2003-2004), graduate assistant coach (2000-2003) and as an assistant wide receiver coach & recruiting coordinator (2004-2012). On November 11, 2011, he was placed on administrative leave and his fixed term contract with PSU ended on June 30, 2012. At the time of his 2012 separation, Mr. McQueary was 37 years old.

We offer no opinion on liability.

We have attached a list of documents reviewed at the end of this report. BLDS is charging hourly rates ranging from \$395 to \$495 for the preparation of this report.

Mr. McQueary has worked in a limited capacity since his separation from PSU, a period of approximately 4.25 years. His job search efforts have included the use of job search websites, industry websites and limited networking. Mr. McQueary has sent resumes for positions within and outside of coaching, although it appears that he was not qualified for many of the non-coaching positions. For example, he applied to numerous technical sales positions (e.g. medical device sales, veterinary medical sales, pharmaceutical sales). Mr. McQueary indicated that he used his football resume even when applying to non-coaching positions.

Labor Market Data 3

In November 2011, the national unemployment rate for white men was 6.2 percent, the unemployment rate in Pennsylvania was 7.3 percent and the unemployment rate in the State College, Pennsylvania MSA was 4.7 percent. The national unemployment rate for white men between the ages of 35 and 39 was 5.8 percent and the unemployment rate for men with at least a bachelor's degree was 4.2 percent.⁴

In November 2011, the median duration of unemployment was 21.8 weeks and the average duration of unemployment was 41.1 weeks. In July 2012, the median duration of unemployment was 15.2 weeks and the average duration of unemployment was 37.4 weeks.

Estimates of Economic Loss

Economic loss is defined as the difference between Mr. McQueary's likely earnings "but for" his separation from PSU in June 2013 and his likely earnings given the separation.

In order to project his earnings in the "but for" world, one must consider Mr. McQueary's likely career path, either within or outside of coaching. Mr. McQueary first became a full-time assistant coach in 2004. For the next seven years he worked as a wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator exclusively for PSU and head coach Joe Paterno.

Labor market data is from the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, <www.bls.gov>.

As of July 2012, these rates were 5.9% (US), 8.6% (PA), 6.6% (MSA); 5.4% (35-39) and 3.7% (at least a Bachelor's).

The coaching profession is one with incredible turnover. Generally, when a new head coach is hired the majority of the assistant coaches must attempt to secure another position elsewhere. A statistic from 2011 indicates that only 31 of the 120 Division I Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) head coaches were in their first, second or third seasons at their then current job. The average years of FBS experience across the major conference head coaches was 6.4 years. ⁵

Most assistant coaches have no true job security. The 20-year assistant coach at one college is rare, that's just the nature of the profession. Thirty-one (31) of the 1,152 full-time assistant coaches in the FBS remained at their 2015 school from 2005-2015, which is only 2.6% of coaches. In addition to the instability, there is intense competition for assistant coaching positions. There are more coaches than spots and an unemployed assistant coach must rely on personal networking to create new opportunities.

Mr. McQueary only coached with one school (PSU) and one head coach (Mr. Paterno), who was also his coach while he was a player. Further, while at PSU, Mr. McQueary did not to develop a network that could aid his future job seeking in coaching. These limitations would eliminate him from consideration for a number of positions and would be considered a detriment when compared to other candidates competing for the same positions.

Outside of coaching, Mr. McQueary would qualify for a variety of positions based on his educational attainment and transferable skills from coaching. Nationally, Bachelor's degree holders working on a full-time basis earned, on average, \$70,432 per year in

2012. In the State College, Pennsylvania MSA, the median earnings of various first-line supervisors was \$41,715 per year in 2015. In our opinion these positions would represent the lower bound to Mr. McQueary's earning capacity outside of coaching.

We provide three estimates of economic loss. Consistent with the average tenure of head coaches cited to earlier, and the fact that assistant coach positions are tied to a given head coach, ¹³ the duration of potential loss in all scenarios is limited to a period of 6 years. Due to the even higher rates of turnover for assistant coaches, calculations beyond 6 years are speculative.

Scenario 1

The first estimate recognizes that Joe Paterno was Mr. McQueary's only coaching supervisor and that following Mr. Paterno's departure, Mr. McQueary's lack of personal network, and limited depth and breadth of coaching experience would have precluded him from securing an alternative coaching position. As Mr. Paterno's position with PSU ended in November 2011, the end of Mr. McQuery's contract in June 2012 would effectively end his coaching employment. Therefore, in the first estimate, the economic loss is \$0.

Scenario 2

The second estimate assumes that following Mr. Paterno's departure, Mr. McQueary's lack of a personal network combined with his limited depth and breadth of coaching experience would have precluded him from securing an alternative coaching position with comparable earnings to his position with PSU. This scenario assumes that he was able to secure an assistant coaching position at a smaller football program. While at

PSU, Mr. McQueary earned \$140,000 per year, placing him in the 65th percentile of assistant coaches. To estimate "but for" earnings with consideration of his lack of a network combined with his limited depth and breadth of coaching experience we project alternate earnings at \$76,957 per year. These earnings are consistent with the average salary of assistant coaches' earnings in deciles nine and ten in the USA Today's 2015 NCAAF Assistant Coaches Salaries data. ¹⁴ Using \$41,715 per year to estimate Mr. McQueary's earning capacity in mitigation yields an economic loss of ranging from \$35,242 to \$211,452. ¹⁵

Scenario 3

The third estimate assumes that despite the limitations in his coaching experience and lack of personal network, he would have been able to secure an alternative coaching position with comparable earnings to his position with PSU. For the reasons cited earlier projecting losses beyond six years is considered speculative. Using \$41,715 per year to estimate Mr. McQueary's earning capacity in mitigation yields an economic loss of ranging from \$98,325 to \$589,950.¹⁶

Former Coach at Penn State Is Charged With Abuse

A former defensive coordinator for the Penn State football team was arrested Saturday on charges of sexually abusing eight boys across a 15-year period. Jerry Sandusky, 67, who had worked with needy children through his Second Mile foundation, was arraigned and released on \$100,000 bail after being charged with 40 counts related to sexual abuse of young boys.

Two top university officials — Gary Schultz, the senior vice president for finance and business, and Tim Curley, the athletic director — were charged Saturday with perjury and failure to report to authorities what they knew of the allegations, as required by state law.

"This is a case about a sexual predator who used his position within the university and community to repeatedly prey on young boys," the Pennsylvania attorney general, Linda Kelly, said in a statement.

Mr. Sandusky was an assistant defensive coach to Joe Paterno, the coach with the most career victories in major college football, who helped propel Penn State to the top tiers of the sport. Until now, the Big Ten university had one of the most sterling images in college athletics, largely thanks to Mr. Paterno and his success in 46 seasons as head coach.

A grand jury said that when Mr. Paterno learned of one allegation of abuse in 2002, he immediately reported it to Mr. Curley. The grand jury did not implicate Mr. Paterno in any wrongdoing, though it was unclear if he ever followed up on his initial conversation with Mr. Curley or tried to alert the authorities himself.

Mr. Sandusky's lawyer said his client had disputed the allegations that prompted a three-year investigation by the attorney general's office.

"He has denied the allegations from the outset," Joseph Amendola, Mr. Sandusky's lawyer, said in a telephone interview Saturday. "We know the allegations were out there, but we didn't know what the allegations were. Jerry has mentioned his innocence, and once we are able to go through this, we'll have more specific responses."

Mr. Curley and Mr. Schultz, the grand jury found, provided false testimony in discussing their response to the 2002 incident. It further found that Mr. Curley committed perjury in repeatedly denying that he had been told that Mr. Sandusky had engaged in sexual misconduct with a child.

The university president, Graham B. Spanier, who the grand jury said had been made aware of the 2002 incident, said in a statement that he stood behind the two officials.

"I have known and worked daily with Tim and Gary for more than 16 years," Mr. Spanier said. "I have complete confidence in how they have handled the allegations about a former university employee."

The grand jury's report stated that the eight boys were singled out for sexual advances or sexual assaults by Mr. Sandusky between 1994 and 2009. All of the accusers first encountered him through activities related to the Second Mile, a foundation for needy children that he founded in 1977. He retired from daily involvement with the Second Mile last fall.

"Through the Second Mile, Sandusky had access to hundreds of boys, many of whom were vulnerable due to their social situations," the report said. According to the grand jury, the assaults occurred in a variety of locations — Penn State football facilities, Mr. Sandusky's home, a high school, a golf resort near the university's State College campus — and none of the boys were thought to be older than 13 when they first met Mr. Sandusky. The report also detailed the boys' access to the Penn State football team; Mr. Sandusky retained access to many athletic facilities even after his retirement in 1999 and had an office in the Lasch Football Building.

Mr. Sandusky brought one boy to San Antonio for the 1999 Alamo Bowl, according to the report, but threatened to send him home when the boy resisted his sexual advances. He reportedly guaranteed that boy that he could walk on to Penn State's football team, and the boy was shown in a photograph with him that appeared in Sports Illustrated.

Another boy attended as many as 15 football games as Mr. Sandusky's guest; Mr. Sandusky brought him into a shower on campus and made the boy touch his genitals, the grand jury said. He placed his hands down the pants of another boy who spent the night at Sandusky's house before home games, the grand jury said.

A graduate assistant for the team told the grand jury he alerted Mr. Paterno in 2002 that he had seen Mr. Sandusky sexually assaulting a boy in the shower at the Lasch Football Building on the Penn State campus. The graduate student told the grand jury he went to Mr. Paterno's home the next day and described what he had seen. Mr. Paterno, in turn, told Mr. Curley.

About a week and a half later, Mr. Curley and Mr. Schultz met with the graduate assistant, then told Mr. Sandusky that he could not bring any children from the Second Mile onto campus, a ban the grand jury said Mr. Curley acknowledged was "unenforceable." The university officials did not alert law enforcement, Ms. Kelly said.

Mr. Schultz testified to the grand jury that there was a similar incident involving a young boy in the football shower with Mr. Sandusky in 1998. The mother of that boy confronted Mr. Sandusky at her home, with two police detectives listening to the conversation. He told the woman, according to testimony by one of the detectives: "I

was wrong. I wish I could get forgiveness. I know I won't get it from you. I wish I were dead."

Mr. Schultz, whose position includes oversight of the university police, testified that he did not know that the university police produced a lengthy report about the 1998 incident. The grand jury found the assertions by him that the 2002 allegations were "not that serious" and that he and Mr. Curley "had no indication that a crime had occurred" contradictory to other testimony.

Mr. Curley and Mr. Schultz were each charged with one count of perjury, a third-degree felony punishable by up to seven years in prison and a \$15,000 fine, in addition to failure to report. Lawyers for the two men released statements proclaiming their clients' innocence.

Jimmy Kennedy, a defensive tackle for the Giants who played at Penn State from 1999 to 2002, said he was shocked and baffled by the allegations against Sandusky. Kennedy, who said Sandusky helped recruit him to Penn State, did an internship at Second Mile during his senior season.

"I never had any type of idea or suspicions about anything like that," Kennedy said. "All the kids loved him."

The grand jury report concluded with an incident that it said occurred in 2000, during a week when the Nittany Lions were away from campus for a game. Late at night, a janitor cleaning the football building said he observed Mr. Sandusky performing oral sex on a boy in a shower. Another worker that night found the shaken janitor, who said, "I just witnessed something in there I'll never forget."

Ex-Penn State Coach Sandusky Arrested on Sex Charges

A former Penn State defensive coordinator was accused Saturday of sexually abusing eight boys in a case that has rocked the Big Ten university.

Jerry Sandusky, 67 years old, was arrested Saturday and released on \$100,000 bail after being arraigned on 40 criminal counts, the state attorney general's office said.

In addition, Penn State athletic director Tim Curley, 57, and Gary Schultz, 62, the school's vice president for finance and business, have been charged with perjury and failing to report what they knew about the allegations. Mr. Schultz's position includes oversight of the university's police department. They were expected to turn themselves in Monday in Harrisburg.

Mr. Sandusky had long been considered the heir apparent to Joe Paterno, the legendary Penn State coach who has the most victories in major-college football history. Mr. Paterno, 84, wasn't charged, authorities said, and the grand jury report didn't appear to implicate him in wrongdoing. When Mr. Paterno first learned of one report of abuse he immediately reported it to Mr. Curley, prosecutors said. Mr. Sandusky was no longer coaching at the time and it isn't clear whether Mr. Paterno followed up with Mr. Curley.

The case represents a major scandal for a school with one of the most pristine images in

college sports. Penn State is one of just four major-conference schools that has never been found guilty of major violations by the NCAA. ("Major" violations are primarily ones that give a school a significant competitive or recruiting advantage.) Boston College, Northwestern and Stanford are the others.

Mr. Sandusky retired in 1999 but continued to work with at-risk children through the nonprofit Second Mile organization he founded in 1977. He was charged with multiple counts of involuntary deviate sexual intercourse, corruption of minors, endangering the welfare of a child, indecent assault and unlawful contact with a minor, as well as single counts of aggravated indecent assault and attempted indecent assault. A preliminary hearing for Mr. Sandusky is scheduled for Wednesday, but his lawyer told reporters it would likely be delayed.

"He's shaky, as you can expect," defense attorney Joe Amendola told WJAC-TV outside the arraignment hearing. "Being 67 years old, never having faced criminal charges in his life, and having the distinguished career that he's had, these are very serious allegations."

Mr. Amendola said Mr. Sandusky has been aware of the allegations for about three years and has maintained his innocence.

Attorney General Linda Kelly called Mr. Sandusky "a sexual predator who used his position within the university and community to repeatedly prey on young boys."

The grand jury said eight boys were targets of sexual advances or assaults by Mr. Sandusky from 1994 to 2009. None were named, and in at least one case, the jury said the child's identity remains unknown to authorities.

No one answered a knock at the door Saturday at Mr. Sandusky's modest, two-story brick home at the end of a dead-end road in State College, Pa.

The grand jury report accuses Messrs. Curley and Schultz of knowing some details of accusations of sex abuse against Mr. Sandusky but failing to tell authorities what they knew.

"It is also a case about high-ranking university officials who allegedly failed to report the sexual assault of a young boy after the information was brought to their attention, and later made false statements to a grand jury," Ms. Kelly said.

"Tim Curley is innocent of all charges against him," said Caroline Roberto, Mr. Curley's attorney, in a statement. "We will vigorously challenge the charges in court, and we are confident he will be exonerated."

Mr. Schultz's attorney, Tom Farrell, also said in a statement, "Gary Schultz is innocent of all charges. We believe in the legal system, and we believe it will vindicate him. We will fight these charges in court, and Gary Schultz will be proven innocent of all of them."

Prosecutors said all of the young men first encountered Mr. Sandusky through Second Mile.

The first to come to light was a boy who met Mr. Sandusky when he was 11 or 12, the grand jury said. The boy received expensive gifts and trips to sports events from Mr. Sandusky, and physical contact began during his overnight stays at Mr. Sandusky's home, jurors said. Eventually, the boy's mother reported the allegations of sexual assault to his high school, and Mr. Sandusky was banned from the child's school district in Clinton County in 2009. That triggered the state investigation that culminated in charges Saturday.

The grand-jury report alleges much earlier instances of abuse, and efforts by some who knew of it to stop it, to no avail.

Ms. Kelly said that in 2002, a graduate assistant saw Mr. Sandusky sexually assault a naked boy, estimated to be about 10 years old, in the locker room of the Lasch Football Building on campus. The grad student and his father reported what he saw to Mr. Paterno, who immediately told Mr. Curley, prosecutors said.

Messrs. Curley and Schultz met with the graduate assistant about a week and a half later, Ms. Kelly said. Nothing happened.

"Despite a powerful eyewitness statement about the sexual assault of a child, this incident was not reported to any law enforcement or child protective agency, as required by Pennsylvania law," Ms. Kelly said.

There's no indication that anyone at school attempted to find the boy, or follow up with the witness, she said.

Mr. Curley denied that the assistant had reported anything of a sexual nature, calling it "merely 'horsing around,' " the 23-page grand jury report said.

But the jury said Mr. Curley was lying, Ms. Kelly said, adding that it also deemed portions of Mr. Schultz's testimony not to be credible.

Mr. Curley testified that he barred Mr. Sandusky from bringing children onto campus and that he advised Penn State President Graham Spanier of the matter.

Mr. Schultz told the jurors he also knew of a 1998 investigation involving sexually inappropriate behavior by Mr. Sandusky with a boy in the showers the football team used. But despite his job overseeing campus police, he never reported the 2002 allegations to any authorities, "never sought or received a police report on the 1998 incident and never attempted to learn the identity of the child in the show in 2002," the jurors wrote. "No one from the university did so."

Mr. Spanier released a statement calling the allegations against Mr. Sandusky "troubling" and adding that Messrs. Curley and Schultz had his unconditional support.

He also predicted they would be exonerated. "I have known and worked daily with Tim and Gary for more than 16 years," he said. "I have complete confidence in how they handled the allegations about a former university employee."
